THE PROBLEM WITH LITTER

It may seem small but it actually is a really big problem! Litter endangers our environment. It pollutes our neighborhoods, decreases property values, and destroys our communities natural beauty. According to ODOT, they spend approximately 4 million dollars per year combating litter near roadsides.

The problem is statewide, but even our little communities struggle with a big litter problem. In 2020, Ross County Litter Control conducted cleanups along nearly 300 miles just in Ross County. This contributed to 831 bags of trash and over 100 large furniture items.

DID YOU KNOW?

- 42% of Ohioans admit to having littered in the past month.
- ODOT crews collect more than 400,000 bags of other people's trash from along the roadsides each year.

LITTER KIT PROGRAM

Our litter kits are designed for safe litter collection practices available for community groups or organizations, non-profits & government offices hosting an event in Ross, Pickaway, Highland or Fayette County. The kits include litter grabbers, vests, gloves and bags.





WISHCYCLING & ILLEGAL DUMPING AT RECYCLING DROP-OFF BINS

Wishcycling: putting something in the recycling bin and hoping it will be recycled, even if there is evidence it is not acceptable.

Innocent thought - big impact. The most common wishcycled item are plastic bags. The plastic bag seems

like a small, harmless item to toss in the bins but it wreaks havoc in the Materials Recovery Facility. Bags and film tangle in the machines causing shutdowns and potentially harm to employees.

Illegal dumping is continuous problem we experience. If you see dumping at the bins, contact local law enforcement. It is against the law to dump trash at the recycling sites!



Annually, we host two kids camps in Pickaway County Park District and Pickaway Soil & Water Conservation District. A three day camp is for students in 3rd-5th grade. Our one day camp is for younger students in 2nd-3rd grade. Kids participated in handson activities related to pollinators, recycling, wildlife, history, STEM projects, archery & more.

The YMCA of Highland County hosted a Veterans picnic and made the ecofriendly decision to offer recycling bins. The District & Community Action loaned the containers for the special event.




LEESBURG
AWARDED GRANT

The Village of Leesburg was awarded grant funds to assist in covering costs for a community clean-up day. Dumpsters were provided to residents to dispose of unwanted items free of charge.



GLASS PLANT TOUR

The District toured the Rumpke glass recycling facility in Dayton, Ohio. This plant is a unique glass recycling facility that cleans and separates glass collected from all over Ohio and surrounding states. It recovers about 40,000 tons of broken and mixed glass, annually.



WHAT HAPPENS TO TIRES & ELECTRONICS COLLECTED AT OUR EVENTS?

After tires are collected at our community events, they are taken to Sundown Tire Recycling. The tires are cut into pieces and tuned into blasting mats, pylon bases, or caution barrel bases.

Accurate IT, an R2v3 certified E-waste company, strives to use as much of the material as possible that they acquire from our electronics collections. What they can't repurpose is broken down into base commodities and properly recycled. They also certify the data destruction on personal devices such as hard drives.
