

## Household Hazardous Waste List

### Acceptable Materials –

#### **Flammables:**

Oil Based Paint  
Stains  
Polishes  
Motor Oil  
Kerosene  
Old Gasoline  
Gasoline mixed with oil  
Spray Paint  
Lighter Fluid  
Propane cylinders & tanks  
Oxygen tanks  
Turpentine  
Thinners

#### **Reactives:**

Cyanides  
Pool Chemicals

#### **Corrosives:**

Acids & Caustics  
Bleach & Household Cleaners  
Paint Strippers

#### **Toxics:**

All Fluorescent Light Bulbs including Compact Fluorescent Lightbulbs (CFL's) and Ballasts.  
Lawn Chemicals & Fertilizers  
Fire Extinguishers  
Rat Poison  
Insecticides  
Antifreeze  
All batteries including alkaline, computer, vehicle, and others.  
**PLEASE NOTE:** Batteries (new and used) can catch fire, if stored in close contact with each other. Batteries should always be stored in storage cases made for this purpose or in the original packaging.

#### **Other:**

Smoke detectors  
Thermostats containing mercury  
Helium tanks

#### **Fats, Oils and Greases:**

Items will be accepted if delivered in a tightly sealed container.

Latex and Water-based paint can be disposed of by using the following methods:

\*Disposal of oil based paint is available at no charge. EEI provides disposal of water based paint to all residents. Please contact EEI for disposal prices of latex paint.

Latex and water-based paints are water soluble and are not considered hazardous. Paint hardeners, cat litter or sawdust may be added to left over latex paint in order to solidify the unused product. The lid may also be left off to speed up the drying process. Once dried it may be disposed of with your regular trash.
